



Tulip Tree (Yellow Poplar) - A fast-growing tree with bright green leaves that resemble tulip flowers in profile & turn gold yellow in fall. Greenish-yellow flowers are carried high in the tree. Stems are aromatic. Likes full sun. Grows to 70' to 90', 40' spread. Grows in acidic, loamy, moist, sandy, well drained, clay soils. Provides food in many forms for many animals. Plant spacing from 6' x7' to 10' x 10''.

Lynwood Gold Forsythia—This popular shrub features prolific yellow flowers smothering the branches in early spring ahead of the leaves. The rest of the year rather unassuming; an upright cultivar with showy bright yellow flowers. Low maintenance and she only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. Grows at a fast rate in full sunlight and in both dry and moist locations & can grow to be about 8 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 10 feet.



White Flowering Dogwood—An excellent landscape choice in all four seasons. Flowers are showy in spring. Leaves turn red-purple in fall. Glossy red fruits attract winter song-birds. Likes partial shade and grows in acidic, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well drained clay soils. Grows at a medium rate to 25' and 25' spread. Great source of food for various animals. Plant 10 to 15 feet apart.

Red Bud—Rosy pink flowers appear in April. Reddish-purple leaves change to dark green, then to yellow. Forms a spreading, graceful crown. Full sun or light shade. Partial shade preferred in windy, dry areas. Grows to 20 to 30 feet and a 30 foot spread. Grows in acidic, alkaline, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well drained, wide range, clay soils. Can be used as exterior rows in a multi-row windbreak. It adds spring color as well as low level wind protection. Plant 8 to 12 feet apart for row spacing & between rows 12 to 18 feet.



Common Lilac—(Vulgaris) is generally described as a perennial shrub. This is not native to the U.S. (United States) and has its most active growth period in the spring and summer. The Common Lilac (Vulgaris) has green foliage and inconspicuous purple flowers, with a moderate amount of conspicuous brown fruits or seeds. The greatest bloom is usually observed in the late spring, with fruit and seed production starting in the summer and continuing until summer. Leaves are not retained year to year. The Common Lilac (Vulgaris) has a moderate life span relative to most other plant species and a moderate growth rate. At maturity, the typical Common Lilac (Vulgaris) will reach up to 20 feet high, with a maximum height at 20 years of 20 feet.

Butterfly Bush - A medium sized to large sized shrub, maturing at about 8' tall by 8' wide or larger (if never pruned). Performs best in full sun in moist, well-drained, fertile soils, but is very adaptable to poor soils, dry soils, and soils of various pH, and is tolerant of heat, drought, and high humidity. Noted for both its showy fragrant flowers and their subsequent wildlife attraction.
